


All Saints Sunday – November 4


Bible and Brews


Women of the ELCA (WELCA) – All women are invited to meet on Tuesday, Nov. 6, at 1:00 p.m.



More About One of Our Mission Partners

Hello Gustavus Adolphus!

I am excited to have an opportunity to share some information about our mission partner, Minnesota Council of Churches- Refugee Services (MCC), and the refugees currently arriving and living in our community. We rekindled this congregation's interest in refugees two years ago with a donation drive for household items. This year we voted to make MCC one of our mission partners; committing to supporting the work they do in our community. In October we gave our first financial contribution to this organization but financial support is only one way to support this work and we hope that our congregation will start to see how else we can get involved. Early next year we will devote a month to refugee awareness. This work is critical to understanding the history of refugees arriving in our communities but also the challenges they face during and after their initial 90-day resettlement process. Following this we hope to engage in volunteer opportunities to strengthen our relationship with this organization and with the refugees they serve.

Christ calls us to care for the vulnerable; this work is not the sole responsibility of the Volunteer Agencies (VOLAG) doing the resettlement work. We are partners in the resettlement process and the more we can do to welcome our new neighbors and offer a helping hand, the better our community will do as a whole. Remember the proverb,

“A chain is only as strong as its weakest link.”

To start off this series, I would like to bring in a few definitions for clarity. Here are a few helpful definitions for those that are not as familiar with who this mission serves:

“Refugees are children, women, and men forced to flee their homes on account of persecution, war, and violence. When refugees cannot return home nor integrate into the first country that provides them safety, they may be eligible for resettlement to a third country. Less than ½ of 1% of the world’s refugees will ever be resettled.” - Courtesy of Episcopal Migration Ministries (one of 9 national agencies that work in partnership with the US government to resettle refugees)

To differentiate, here is the definition of an asylum seeker as provided by U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS):

“An alien in the United States or at a port of entry who is found to be unable or unwilling to return to his or her country of nationality, or to seek the protection of that country because of persecution or a well-founded fear of persecution. Persecution or the fear thereof must be based on the alien’s race, religion, nationality, membership in a particular social group, or political opinion.”

Refugees go through a long resettlement process before and after arriving in the US.

“Resettlement is the selection and transfer of refugees from a country in which they have sought protection to a third country. This differs from the asylum process, whereby individuals who have reached the United States are granted protection. Resettlement can take 18-24 months or longer from referral to arrival in the United States.” -Courtesy of the US Department of State

Once arriving in the US, refugees are welcomed by agencies like MCC who will take the next 90 days to help the family secure housing, enroll in school, find employment, as well as helping them find the other necessities needed to start a new chapter of their life in a new country. Refugees arrive with very little so beyond the immediate necessities listed above, they also need to locate household items, clothing, personal hygiene products, etc. As you can see, the list of needs is very long and MCC has limited time to connect these individuals and families with everything they need. That’s where the community (like

Gustavus Adolphus) comes in! We can help refugees in our community learn the things we already know how to do: navigating the bus system, utilizing the library system, making purchases in the grocery store, etc. While MCC is working on the necessities, we can help with the little things that make transitioning to a new culture smoother.

Member Spotlight

Gustavus Adolphus – November 2018

I’ve decided to write about our building for my final article on the series devoted to introducing the members of Gustavus Adolphus. I’m writing this from the perspective of sitting across from “the building” and having a conversation about what it feels like to take care of all of the people who come here to worship God. I took the same questions that I ask our members and asked “the building” about them. Some of the answers are humorous as you can see. Others are thought-provoking.

Tell me how you came to be at Gustavus Adolphus?

You mean, how did I “come to be” me? Well, it was because some NE’ers decided to build a church back in 1902 and this lot was available. In my early years I was smaller and built of a wood/brick structure. The brick has worn well, but my wood parts wear out quicker and need repair more often. I’m glad that this church takes care of me so well. Some years were pretty tough for them (the 1930’s, and 2008/9 in particular) but they have always managed to respond and do what’s needed to keep me in good condition.

What drew you to become a member of the Gustavus Adolphus community?

I know my purpose and role is to be a shelter for people and to provide a safe setting for them to gather to worship God. I was designed to allow them to explore and fully appreciate a relationship with God. All of my spaces allow a place for my family to work together to serve God, our families, and our community. I am a provider and I love seeing how our congregation works together to bring God into our community. While my purpose is to help people strengthen their relationship with God, it is also God’s desire to send people back out into the community to serve and help people in their daily lives. God wants to grow his family and If everybody stays inside the church, we can’t grow!

What are some of your life’s experiences that affect your Faith and relationship with God?

I can’t fulfill my purpose without people. And I’ve outlasted a lot of people in my time, so I’m always interested to see new members join or visit our congregation. While my role is to be a shelter, it’s ultimately the people who are on God’s heart, not the buildings!

The way people learn about God is to join together, worship, and teach and share God with others. I provide a space for that to happen. People gather to baptize, get married, celebrate a life’s ending, and to learn how to serve others. I’m also an opportunity for people to learn how to serve: I need care and maintenance – quite a bit it seems. I need to keep my roof in good condition so it doesn’t leak or fall down. I need windows that shine light without showing cracks or fissures, and I need floors that don’t creak or split. Fortunately, the GA people have been very thoughtful about taking care of most of my needs. I’m very grateful for that!

What else would you like to share to the people of Gustavus Adolphus?

I sit right in the heart of NE Minneapolis, surrounded by people who live in tidy homes. I would like to meet them! I just know that if they are invited here, they would feel a peace and welcome that would give them rest. My purpose is to shelter people and give them the opportunity to be part of a community. I am worried that people will forget about us. My biggest worry is that we would cease to be a worship center and instead be converted to a full-time school or art colony. That’s happening to a lot of churches, you know. I want to be a home to a people willing to step out and serve others while serving God.

Author’s notes: I hope you enjoyed the story. As you sit in church, take a moment to reflect on all that we have been given by people who have gone before us. I am very thankful for all of the pastors, administrators, and worshippers who have built our church and our legacy. – *Cindy Bach*

Great news! Council approved Finance’s recommendation to appropriate this gift in the following manner: General Fund: \$8,010.00; Mission: \$5,338.00; Endowment Fund: \$13,348.00.
