Winter Parking Restrictions Will Affect 27th Avenue!

From the City of Minneapolis... Following this three-day snow emergency, winter parking restrictions begin at 8:00 a.m. on Wednesday, Feb. 27, to ensure city streets are passable for emergency vehicles, buses, and other travelers in the face of heavy snow accumulation this winter.



Winter Parking Restrictions mean parking will be banned on the EVEN-numbered side of non-snowemergency routes until April 1, unless conditions allow the city to lift the ban earlier. 27th Avenue, on the south side of our church building, is one such route.

Parking **is** allowed on snow emergency routes (Johnson St. for example), parkways, and the ODDnumbered side of 27th Avenue.



Maybe it's the weather this year. Yesterday brought I don't know how many inches of snow again, with way-too-familiar terrible driving on treacherous streets and backaches from shoveling the stuff.

With the snow comes the impulse to hibernate. Tom and I have a wood burning fireplace that can only be used under Goldilocks conditions (not too hot outside - no fun for a fire, not too cold - house heat goes up the chimney), and there have been a few Friday nights and Saturday days/nights that have been ok to light a match. Nice!

With that hibernation, seems to come slowing down. I know, we are itching for spring, but let's continue the contemplative mood just a bit longer, and keep it going for Lent 2019. Ash Wednesday is March 6, and has its own service; but starting March 13, and for every Wednesday through April 10, will be GA Wednesday evening soup suppers and Lenten worship.

We will continue the Holden Village worship liturgy/music this year, which also allows for a "break" in the middle for message, faith story, etc. This year we will be listening to excerpts from the writings of great Christian thinkers: Thomas à Kempis, Henri Nouwen, C S Lewis, and more. Each will be speaking from a different perspective of Christian "streams" of thought: contemplative tradition, holiness tradition, word-centered tradition, social justice tradition, spirit-filled tradition, sacramental tradition, and the overall subject of discipleship.

The readings will not be long, shorter than a sermon. And each week, Reflection Questions and Suggested Exercises will be handed out for people to follow-up outside of the Wednesday evening worship if desired.

All of these resources come from Renovaré, a Christian non-profit group dedicated to helping Christians obtain a deeper and more balanced spiritual life. I have obtained permission to use the materials as outlined, no copyright issues.

Notes about January 2019 financials:

At our annual meeting in January, the congregation approved a \$345,535 budget for 2019. This budget supports the needs, hopes, and dreams of our congregation from co-creating meaningful worship, to caring for our building, to supporting our mission partners and the work we do in our community. We know this takes heart, time, and money. Our 2019 budget is a challenge for us to stretch ourselves—both our time and financial giving. To meet this commitment, our congregation will need to increase offering giving. In January, we did (compare January 2018 giving to 2019); however, our giving will need to exceed last year's by over 6%. As we continue our work in 2019, let us be thankful for all that God has given us and consider how we can generously give our time and money.

Thoughts on Generosity...

Remember this: Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly and whoever sows generously will also reap generously. Each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to bless you abundantly, so that in all things at all times, having all that you need, you will abound in every good work.

- 2 Corinthians 9:6-8

Sometimes I'm not cheerful. Sometimes I'm cranky. I'm cranky when I'm hungry. When I'm tired. When projects don't go smoothly. But I'm especially cranky when I'm overwhelmed. It's when I feel most stressed that I start thinking micro. I think how my to-do list can be engineered to fit into my pre-determined window of time. I think about how my budget will not go as far as I wish it could. I start to wonder if I need to eliminate activities, expenses, obligations, relationships. And then, I devolve from crankiness to resentment and score keeping.

The way out of this cycle, I've learned, is generosity. It is the pure act of giving cheerfully and giving boldly that moves me from thinking micro to thinking macro. It is then that I look up and outward, instead of inward. I move past my own anxieties around scarcity to finding the richness and abundance that surrounds me. Abandoning my agenda for the day and helping a person in need... Immediately writing a large check to cover appeal... Investing volunteer time lead an event... These bold acts of generosity sometimes have made me cranky, but they haven't left me without, rather, they have added to the richness in my life.

Council passed a resolution in February that we will individually tithe in 2019. I know that this will not make me immune from crankiness in 2019. But I know in this bold act, God will bless me abundantly. What will you decide in your heart to give cheerfully?

Happy March, Everyone!

We have now completed our month focusing on refugees to highlight the work our mission partner, Minnesota Council of Churches–Refugee Services (MCC), does in our community. I am thrilled that there were so many of you that took the time to stay after worship to listen to our speakers and learn more about one refugee's experience and how refugee resettlement works in the US.

I want to challenge you this month to reflect on everything you have learned about refugees and come up with some action steps. How do I take the knowledge I have gained and use it to benefit the refugees in my community and in the world? What's one small step I can take this week? Can I push myself further and try something I've never done before? *Maybe I could check out a book* from the library on a specific ethnic group reflected in my community? Maybe I could offer to join a conversation group at the library to help others strengthen their English skills or start taking a language class myself to learn a language used by refugees in my community? Maybe I could ask if they need volunteers for the English classes held by Open Door Learning Center here at our church? Maybe I could strike up a friendly conversation and specifically mention that he/she is welcome here with a refugee at the grocery store, bus stop, or school? Maybe I can write a letter to my senator expressing my support for the refugee resettlement program? Maybe I could share some of what I've learned with a neighbor while shoveling the snow off of my driveway? The possibilities are endless! I encourage you to not sit on this information but share it!

I also wanted to thank everyone for the toilet paper and hand soap donations. As of the 24th of February, we have collected 373 rolls of toilet paper and 65 bottles of hand soap. These donations will go directly to newly arrived refugees to help set up their first home in the US. Thank you again for your continued generosity!

During the month of February, we utilized the back side of the blue insert in our bulletins to collect questions that congregants had and to gauge interest in volunteering with MCC. To date we have 22 individuals who have stepped forward to show their support and offer a hand in helping set up an apartment for a newly arrived refugee family. We have not received the exact date for when the next family will arrive, but have been told that there are a few families in March that MCC is in the process of getting ready to welcome. Once we know there is a plan set for housing, we will contact our list of volunteers and create a plan to set up a home for the new family. We will be moving furniture to the appropriate rooms, putting linens in the closets, and setting up bed frames (if applicable), etc. If you missed the opportunity to fill out the blue insert to volunteer but are interested in helping out if it works with your schedule, please contact Hannah Rosebrock or myself and we will happily add you to the list.

Lastly, I would like to thank Pastor Jo, Phil, and our church council as they supported the vision that Hannah and I had for the month. I hope that the speakers and resources we have shared this month have helped you to stop and think more about our refugee neighbors. I look forward to highlighting more refugee topics and events in the future to support our refugee neighbors.

In the meantime, please mark your calendars for these upcoming events that celebrate the diversity of our state and promote awareness of refugee issues around the world: World Refugee Day on June 20; Twin Cities Refugee Day on Sunday, July 14; and the Festival of Nations that runs from Friday, May 3, through Sunday, May 5. If you are interested in a lecture series, the University of MN is hosting a series of authors with recent works featuring the complexities of human migration. These events are free and open to the public: Mohsin Hamid, author of Exit West, will speak on Wednesday, March 13, at 2:00 p.m. at the Coffman Memorial Union Theater and Francisco Cantu, author of The Line Becomes a River: Dispatches from the Border, will speak on Wednesday, April 3, at 10:00 a.m. at the Cowles Auditorium, Humphrey School of Public Affairs.

4 for Dinner

It started out as a quiet night at home. I found myself with a free evening with no particular agenda and alone as my husband was out of town. It had been a very busy week and I was looking forward to hanging around the house attending to small tasks and responsibilities. But as I entered the house and dropped off my coats and packages, I found myself thinking of my bible reading. I was looking forward to starting a new bible study workbook that I had just acquired. As I busied myself with dinner preparations, my thoughts drifted to the Holy Spirit and the book on the Holy Spirit I had recently read. The writer of that book spoke of the Holy Spirit in a very intimate manner. It was clear that he knew the Holy Spirit intimately.

I wondered about that and about how one gets to know and understand the third person of the Holy Triune. The Holy Spirit seems to play a very quiet role, but this writer spoke of the power of the Holy Spirit in a very dynamic and active manner. It occurred to me I too could encounter that same personality in my own home. I thought then that it would be a good night to invite God, Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit into my house for dinner. Why not, I thought, because God makes it very clear that he loves to be with us so let's have a dinner party at my house and invite them to join me.

So, I did just that: I set the table with 4 plates, utensils, and water glasses: one for each of us. I then made enough dinner for maybe 2 people (just being realistic) and lit some candles. In a short amount of time I sat down for prayer and quietly invited my guests to join me for dinner.

They showed up as I requested. A peace and calmness fell over the room and I could sense the atmosphere turn liquid with their grace. While I ate, I imagined the lively conversation flowing between the three of them as they inquired about how I was doing and how they could help me. I sensed that they wanted to know about my challenges and triumphs and that they wanted to encourage me and to help me. I felt pleasure that I had invited them to be a guest in my home. It was peaceful.

While I can't remember what I served, I do remember how I felt at this event. I would like to share this with you so that it might give you some encouragement if you find yourself dining alone and wishing you had some company. Because you are never alone, and yes, they would love to have an invitation to spend time with you.

Writing about an experience like this makes one wonder how it will be received: "did she really do something that silly?" To which I say, "why not and let's see what happens!" If we pray over our meals, it should be understood that God hears and will make himself known as we request. We should therefore not be surprised when things change. This is after all what we ask for as a congregation every Sunday, is it not?
