

Transition Musings by Interim Pastor Susan Masters

Our Transition Team has helped us name a shared concern about weak communication, a history of conflict, and a lack of connection here at GA. To help us talk more about these matters, they asked me to preach about forgiveness. Below are excerpts from that sermon on September 19.

Forgiveness

.... Over the years, I've come to believe that we struggle with living out what forgiveness IS because we are confused about what forgiveness is NOT. For example:

- Forgiving deeply hurtful behavior is NOT the same thing as forgiving someone for stealing your lunch out of the refrigerator, and it's silly to treat the two offenses the same.
- Some wounds can take a very long time to recover from. Jesus is clear about that. In Matthew, when Peter asks him how many times he's obligated to forgive someone, Jesus tells him: "Forgive 70 x 7" which is to say: Forgiveness might be a journey
- Forgiveness is NOT denial or downplaying that something hurtful has happened. The starting point must be - loud and clear - that wrongdoing has happened, and brokenness is the lingering wound. It's hard to forgive that which has not been named and acknowledged.
- Forgiveness does NOT mean that all the accompanying emotions suddenly go away. You can forgive someone and still experience anguish, and mourning, and lament these are scripturally appropriate responses to having been harmed.
- Similarly, forgiveness does NOT mean there won't still be work to be done. Repentance and transformation go hand in hand. If a person or a system says "I'm sorry, we're sorry", you have a right to expect the wrongdoing won't happen again to you, or to someone else. And that usually takes ongoing work of some kind. Sometimes even structural change.
- Forgiveness does NOT always lead to healing and reconciliation. Sometimes when the harm is so egregious, we can forgive someone, but never be their friend, or attend a family gathering where they're present, or have any contact with them ever again. Forgiveness does not require that we again and again subject ourselves to the source of our pain.
- And forgiveness is NOT always quick and easy. As theologian Debbi Thomas puts it, "Forgiveness is a process a messy, non-linear, and often barbed process that can leave us feeling whole and liberated one minute, and bleeding out of every vein the next." If your effort at forgiving someone feels like a roller coaster, that's okay. It probably is.

So, if forgiveness is NOT all these things, what IS it?

- As Christians, forgiveness is something we extend because it has been extended to us. In a big way. By
 God. And also because few of us will get through our lives without ever harming someone else—in a
 small way or in a big way. And it's appropriate to extend to others the same forgiveness we claim and
 hope for, for ourselves.
- Forgiveness is freedom. When we are finally able to say, "Enough. I want to be free of this burden it no
 longer serves me in any reasonable or helpful way, in fact, it's harming me a second time" when we can
 do this, we free ourselves from the constant pressure of rewriting our past and reliving the pain again
 and again. We also liberate ourselves from allowing our pain to make us victims and our woundedness to
 become our identity.

So, yeah, forgiveness is complicated, isn't it? Even Jesus seemed to understand that. AND, to be clear, the call to forgive remains. Jesus does not mince words about that. But we don't need to make forgiveness more difficult with our misunderstandings about what Jesus is calling us to do.

.... The missional potential of this congregation is enormous! ... And our testimony to the abundant mercy and forgiveness of God is best borne out by the witness of our own lives. It gets a little tricky to call the world into the hard work of racial justice and reconciliation when we are still harboring conflict over events we may or may not any longer fully remember. Friends, don't underestimate the power of such unresolved conflicts among us to derail the missional efforts we feel called to engage in the world around us. There's a reason Jesus is so urgent about the matter...!

This morning, the transition team invites you to consider the places in your own lives where forgiveness is needed: Forgiving others. Being forgiven BY others. Forgiving ourselves. One time. Seven times. Seventy times seven. For your own sake. For the sake of this community of faith. For the sake of our missional calling. For the sake of the world that is waiting for us to get this right. Amen.

Upcoming Memorial Service for Vi Dorumsgaard


