What Should We Do About the South Parking Lot?

Special Congregational Gathering
This Sunday, May 1 - Immediately following worship
We will meet in the Sanctuary (and on Zoom!)

You may have noticed that the south parking lot is rapidly deteriorating. In addition to being a neighborhood eyesore and environmentally unfriendly (due to storm water runoff), the condition worsened such that the lot could not be plowed this winter. Prior to COVID, the Property Committee presented multiple options to the congregation, including re-purposing the property, repaving, or selling. Any option would require significant investment or a strategic decision by the congregation. A Parking Lot Task



Force was commissioned, which found the congregation divided on how best to move forward. Now, the Property Committee and the Church Council have restarted these conversations with the goal of identifying a path forward.

And, we have not forgotten about Bibles for our third graders. We had scheduled a Sunday to hand them out twice now, and both times we had to cancel when the virus ramped up again. We now plan to distribute Bibles to our third graders in worship on **Sunday, May 22**. We hope all our third graders can be with us in the sanctuary that day to receive their Spark Bibles.


Families should watch for some other special features in our May 22 worship geared toward our children!

Transition Musings Interim Pastor Susan Masters

... In Luke's account, those hearing the women's testimony of the empty tomb call it an "idle tale" – which in the original Greek can mean everything from pointless to garbage to delirious... And on the face of it, it IS an idle tale. No one is expecting resurrection here – grave snatchers, maybe - they were common at the time - but not resurrection. Nothing about the events in the past three days could possibly have prepared them for anything other than a body in a tomb. The followers of Jesus have barely wrapped their minds around crucifixion. Death is the assumption. Fear is the assumption. Despair is the assumption. Resurrection would, indeed, be an idle tale. It would be garbage. It would be pointless. It would imply delirium.....

And it is also the good news of the gospel.

Because resurrection, with all its ridiculous claims, pushes them beyond the circumstances of the past three days and reminds them that something bigger than them is at work. They actually CAN look for the living among the dead because death no longer holds them. Not in the ways it used to.

... Resurrection is the YES in response to the NO of Roman empire. It is the YES that, 2000+ years later, continues to give us the audacity to look for the living among the dead. The audacity to hear an idle tale that can't possibly be true, yet still believe it. Believe it despite the circumstances of the past three days. Or the past two years. Or a past lifetime.

Resurrection is real, my friends, and we're all part of it. Sometimes we are the women who show up at the tomb, then run to bear witness to what we have seen. Sometimes we are Peter and the others struggling to believe because of everything that has happened in our lives. Sometimes we are all of it, multiple times on the same day, moving in and out of belief. And that's OK. Theologian David Lose writes, "If you don't find resurrection at least a little hard to believe, you probably aren't taking it very seriously."

Indeed. If you stick around over the next couple of Sundays, you will witness the Belief Roller Coaster that all the disciples take a ride on in the days following resurrection - and they were first-hand eyewitnesses! Struggling to believe, it seems, is an acceptable part of the journey... And, apparently, there's space for all of it....

My friends, what is the idle tale that you are bold to believe this morning? What far-fetched truth are you tenaciously hanging on to despite the circumstances swirling around you? And what is the idle tale you WANT to believe this morning, but you can't? What is the NO of your life that you need the YES of resurrection to shout down? Or at least to quiet down?

Is it about your job? Is it about a relationship that is precious to you? Is it about your health? Is it about the overwhelming injustice in our world that just never seems to take a break? Is it about simply being done with a pandemic that has gone on 2 ½ years too long and you are simply not coping as well as you did in those early days?

No one who went to that tomb expected resurrection. Not a single one of them. And still - resurrection happened. A resounding YES to the ongoing NO of their lives. A story that was true whether anyone believed it - or them.

And it's the story into which we have all been invited this morning. With belief, without belief. Still deep in the throes of the trauma of crucifixion - or with healing swirling around us. This is your story, this is my story. And never has an idle tale been so sweet and offered so much hope.

Thanks be to God. Amen.



From Our Church Council President

Dear Congregation,

Our chimney is finally ready to be repaired! As you may remember, the Congregation approved an increased annual budget to cover the cost of repairing the chimney as well as to cover other rising costs that seem to be affecting all aspects of our lives these days. The church has not been immune to these cost increases, most recently the utility costs this winter. While our expenses are aligned with the approved budget, our giving has fallen short and we're looking at a significant deficit.

Here are ways that our congregation can help improve our financial situation:

- 1. Consider a one-time special offering to help pay for the chimney and utility costs. We're calling this our "Fire and Ice" fund. We need approximately \$25,000. That is around \$250 for each giving unit in the congregation. (See "Call to Action" article below.)
- 2. Consider raising your regular offering by six percent, commensurate with the annual budget increase that was approved.
- 3. Keep an eye out for a capital campaign to kick off this summer. We will be raising money to improve our technology in the sanctuary and tackle some much needed building maintenance.

March 2022 YTD Actual Income of \$66,151.24 represents 77% of our budgeted \$86,203.68. March 2022 YTD Expenses of \$83,537.42 represent 97% of our budgeted \$86,203.41. The -\$17,386.18 difference constitutes our YTD deficit.

As compared to last year, YTD our income is -\$12,645.62 and our expenses are up \$1,607.59.
