From Pastor Ian

Siblings in Christ,

Last week, as I was walking home after dropping Leonora off at daycare, I was greeted by a lovely sight. I happened to look up at one of the trees, and there, among the green leaves, I spotted a small area that had already



begun its transformation into a deep, rich red. This was an unmistakable sign that autumn is on its way. As someone who cherishes the changing of the seasons, I couldn't help but feel a surge of excitement.

The experience brought back a flood of memories from my childhood. In the backyard of our family home stood a towering oak tree. It seemed that no matter how many times we raked up its leaves, the tree would shed more, and the process would repeat itself. We'd gather the fallen leaves onto big tarps and then drag them to the back of our property, where they'd join a growing compost pile. Over the course of the fall and winter, because of decay and the work of earthworms, that mound of leaves would transform into fertile soil. It was a pattern we repeated year after year, experienced through so many sensory experiences—the smell of the leaves, the satisfying crunch underfoot, and the crisp coolness of the autumn air.

In many ways, our life in the church mirrors the natural world's ebb and flow. We, too, are in a cyclical rhythm as we follow the liturgical year—the church calendar. Just as we anticipate the leaves changing colors in the fall, we find signs and markers within our worship life that orient us in this journey. Reformation Sunday and All Saints Sunday are two such signposts. While the specifics of how each Lutheran congregation observes these occasions may vary, certain elements often remain familiar: the melodies of cherished hymns like "A Mighty Fortress" and "For All the Saints," the warm glow of candles, and the reading of names in memory, all set against the backdrop of red and white vestments and paraments.

These special services serve a dual purpose. They remind us of the origins of our reforming tradition and offer us an opportunity to honor our beloved saints who have found their eternal rest. They also a call to action in the present. Reformation is not merely a historical event; it's an ongoing process, a verb that beckons us to engage with our faith and our world. We are the living inheritors of a legacy shaped by those who have journeyed before us.

As the leaves continue to fall, providing that lovely crunch underfoot, I invite you to pay attention to the changes unfolding within our life of worship. Just as the seasons turn and return, so too do the rhythms of our faith. We are connected to the traditions of the past, and we look ahead with hope to the seasons yet to come.

As the leaves fall and nourish the earth, so too may our worship and our lives serve to enrich the soil of our being, cultivating a deeper and more vibrant faith for generations to come.





From Deacon Phil

We're Learning a New Liturgy Setting!

If you've been to worship in the last several weeks, you know we have been learning some musical pieces of a new liturgical setting. This setting comes from Augsburg Fortress' new hymnal supplement, *All Creation Sings*. So far, we have learned a new Canticle of Praise (*Glory to You, God*), and a new Gospel Acclamation.

Although we are not purchasing printed copies of this hymnal supplement, our copyright license with Augsburg Fortress permits us to print hymns, songs, and liturgy pieces in our bulletins. We have been enjoying some of the hymns from the supplement for months now. I attended a workshop in Philadelphia about introducing the supplement in worship during my sabbatical leave this summer and became familiar with this setting of the liturgy. I thought it would be a good fit for our congregation.





To help familiarize people with these musical pieces, we will have a pre-service rehearsal for the congregation on October 1 at 9:20 a.m. Come early and sing them with the choir. Then when you encounter them in the liturgy, they'll be a little more familiar. We hope you will grow to enjoy this new musical setting as we broaden our congregation's repertoire.



GA Choir Welcomes Four New Singers

The new choir season has recently begun. The GA Choir will sing in worship for the first time on October 1. The choir was hit hard after our return to in-person worship following the pandemic shutdown; almost half of our singers did not return to choir for one reason or another. As you probably know, the Open Door Learning Center, which has been providing literacy classes in our building for approximately six years, has left our building as of the end of September. We have enjoyed and treasured this partnership these six years and will miss having the Open Door Learning Center in our building. We wish them well as they continue to provide classes in their new location. Christian Preston, morning coordinator of the program, who has spoken to our congregation in worship on more than one occasion, wrote a thank you letter that he wanted to share with everyone. Read on!

Hi GA community!

Well, we've had a wonderful 6 years, but sadly it's come time for Open Door NE to finally shut the doors. There have been three Open Door Learning Centers in Minneapolis for several years (there's actually been an Open Door Adult Learning center in Northeast for 30+ years) hosted by churches, libraries, schools and more, but the offerings at the different sites have been quite inconsistent. So, the decision has been made to combine the three learning centers into one new site that can provide the highest quality instruction and wrap-around services to all our Minneapolis participants.

Which is all well and good, but it's still hard to say goodbye to this really special community. Since we opened the school here at GA on Oct 15, 2017, Open Door NE has welcomed 834 immigrants and refugees from over 50 countries, and 275 volunteers tutors from around the Twin Cities. These 1,109 lifelong learners have spent over 93,000 hours in the GA education wing working on English instruction, digital literacy skills, learning to navigate life in America, and possibly most important, sharing in a community where people feel welcome and respected. This would not have been possible without you opening up your space with us these last 6 years.

Thank you for sharing this very special location with us. Thank you for being so intentional about opening your doors to the community. You have made a big difference in the lives of many Northeast neighbors!

FYI, the new Open Door Minneapolis campus is located at 627 West Broadway Ave, Minneapolis, MN 55411. Classes will be starting Sept 25; please feel welcome to come and say hello!

Save the date for January, 28, 2024, for the annual meeting! In preparation this fall, the council and committees are starting the budget process. You can help us plan by sharing information about your giving intentions.

Meanwhile, the property committee is moving forward to obtain bids for capital projects. Read more about how they will prioritize projects with the funds available. We are expecting to begin with audio equipment and if we get information in time, will call a special congregational meeting prior to January.

Council is also working on constitutional amendments and by-law changes. You can expect to see copies in the Narthex soon. These discussions will be added onto existing congregational meetings.

Finally, members of council and staff are meeting regularly with Mt. Carmel to clarify our work together.

Volunteer Opportunities & Thank Yous

<u>Thank you</u> to long time bell choir member, Mary Nelson Yunker, and <u>thank you</u> to our choir members (including the 4 new members!)! We appreciate hearing their music during worship!

There is an <u>opportunity</u> to join our stewardship team. This is the only unstaffed committee and it needs our attention. Our congregation has many hopes and dreams - bright things are ahead for us! We need GA members who can be thoughtful about helping our congregation share their time, talent, and resources. Life Together Project Update

September, 2023

Hello!

I am pleased to share an update on behalf of our Church Council regarding our *Life Together* Campaign. As you know, we had a very successful campaign and we were able to raise \$185,000 in pledges! Nearly \$60,000 of that has already been received!



While we are humbled by the generosity of our members, we did fall short of our aspirational goal of \$250,000. This means we need to trim back on some of the proposed projects and prioritize what elements fall best within the intentions of the campaign. This is only a proposed list as there are likely to be adjustments as we learn more about the costs of each of the items below. In any case, the council will return to the congregation in alignment with our constitution prior to commencing with work with a value greater than \$15,000.

When we subtract our 10% mission partner commitment and our capital campaign costs, we have approximately \$146,000 to meet our goals. With these resources, we will do amazing things to support our mission of building community where God is at the center.

Our property committee is proposing the following:

- 1. We propose reducing our anticipated Audio Visual investment from \$60,000 to \$25,000. We will continue to work with volunteers from the congregation as well as suppliers to understand our options for meeting this budget. We have identified items that could be deferred to future projects and are keeping the following goals in mind:
 - a. Improve the visual and audio experience for our online worship.
 - b. Improve the reliability of our streaming during online worship.
 - c. Provide a system that is easy to use for volunteers and the training to operate it.
 - d. Eliminate cords and cables taped to the floor.
 - e. Return all equipment generously loaned from our members.
- 2. Maintain the \$75,000 budget to repair and resurface the South Parking Lot. We are currently exploring a grant to help offset the cost and we will know more about the final costs when we are done with the design phase and have a better understanding of the grant and city requirements.
- 3. Reduce the Maintenance Budget from \$96,000 to \$40,000. We have prioritized the maintenance and repair of critical items and de-prioritized items that are more cosmetic in nature. Our recommendations include:
 - a. Patch, repair and clean the kitchen floor and both floors of the education wing in lieu of replacement.
 - b. Maintain budget to replace the lower level Narthex furnace and AC unit when needed.
 - c. Reduce scope of painting and crack repair in the Sanctuary.
 - d. Reduce general maintenance fund for unexpected repairs.

While these reductions are not insignificant, we believe we can meet the spirit of our campaign with this new adjusted budget. We ask for your continued patience as we work with vendors and contractors to finalize the costs associated with the work above. There are exciting times ahead!

I wanted to take a moment to share how incredible our increase in gifts from last year to this year has been. If you look at the chart, we are giving over \$30K MORE this year than last year. That is truly amazing and something to be celebrated.



I know we are still running about \$3,000 - \$5,000 below what we need each month for our expenses, but I just wanted to say a big THANK YOU to everyone for adjusting their giving as they can. You are all truly a blessing to this church and this community.

Just a friendly reminder of what the ideal giving would need to be for each of the 68 giving units:

- \$87.40 every week OR
- \$378.60/month OR
- \$4,545 yearly
