Beloved in Christ,

I once was asked why we didn't have a Confession and Forgiveness as part of our worship service. Why wasn't there a time when the pastor spoke a word of absolution: "As a called and ordained pastor...and by Christ's authority, I declare to you the entire forgiveness of all your sins."? I will admit that I was kind of caught off guard, as no one had EVER asked why this or that part of the liturgy (the pattern of worship we follow) changed.

I responded by saying that while we generally begin most worship services with Confession and Forgiveness, during the season of Easter we often substitute a Thanksgiving for Baptism in place of the Confession and



Forgiveness. And while they certainly are different in how they engage with it, both relate to us being recipients of God's act of forgiveness and mercy. And they both speak a word of absolution. This seasonal substitution is especially poignant during Easter, a time when there is intense focus on baptism and the promises made through the water.

Then I got to thinking about other seasonal changes we make that people might be curious about (or maybe haven't even noticed!).

- During the season of Lent, there has long been the tradition of "burying" the alleluia, or not speaking/ saying alleluia awaiting the joy of Easter to share in that exclamation once again. So During the 40 days of Lent, we didn't speak, or sing, or pray alleluia! This is most noticeable in our gospel acclamation which at other times is FILLED with Alleluias!
- During most of the year, we share in the Apostles' Creed, but on some Sundays we profess the Nicene Creed. While both are true declarations of the faith of our church, the longer Nicene Creed is usually professed on feast days like Christmas, and Easter, and Pentecost, with the more succinct Apostles' Creed being shared more frequently.
- The words and prayers that I lead are also seasonal. For example, the Offering Prayer, The Invitation to Communion, the Prayer after Communion, the Blessing and the Dismissal all are used throughout an entire season which can give some continuity and meaning for a period of time, but also a newness that one experiences each new season (after one month, or two, or three).

I hope that through our familiar yet fluid words and actions of worship that we might be drawn ever deeper into a place of encountering God and our neighbor. And if you ever have any questions about why we do what we do, never hesitate to ask!

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From Deacon Phil

As we prepare to celebrate the 15th anniversary of GA becoming a Reconciling in Christ congregation, I went back and found a speech I had shared with the congregation five years ago when we marked the 10th anniversary. Rather than write something new, I decided I would include portions of what I wrote in 2019, as the remarks still pertain today. I am so proud of the work GA has done as a RIC congregation, I am happy that I was part of the original task



force that helped guide the congregation through the discernment process in 2008-2009, and I look forward to what the future holds as we continue to live into what it means to be an "evermore welcoming community."

From what I wrote in 2019:

Even though the RIC congregational vote was ten years ago, I remember it vividly like it was ten days ago. I don't remember a time when I was so nervous. After a year or more of preparation for the vote – of meetings and educational events, conversations, movie showings, etc. – the time had finally come for the long-awaited vote. I arrived at church early that Sunday morning, as was my habit, to practice and get ready for worship. I encountered Lynn Lurvey in one of the rooms. She had come to church early to pray about the meeting. She said something to me that has stuck with me these ten years, and I paraphrase: *Whatever the outcome of the vote today, our congregation will never be the same.* She was right. And that's what made me so nervous. Because I knew that if the congregation voted "no" on becoming a RIC congregation, I would need to leave this congregation that I had already grown to love; and I knew that a whole group of other like-minded people would probably do the same.

I stayed silent during the meeting, which was difficult. As a gay man, I had only come out to a select group of people at GA so far. I did not want to speak at the meeting as a gay man and make the decision about me in any way; I also decided that I had had my chance as a member of the Task Force to speak and make my opinions widely known for the year-plus leading up to the vote. I listened as people spoke for and against us becoming RIC. As people spoke against welcoming GLBT people into our church, I was struck by how much fear there was. I wanted to ask: "What's so scary about me and people like me? We're just people." But I stayed silent.

Finally, the debate ended and we voted. The results were close but clear. Those present had voted that Gustavus Adolphus would become a Reconciling in Christ congregation. There was an awkward silence after the results were announced. Then Pastor Stefan Rickman did something that people on both sides of the vote still talk about as one of the most spiritual things they ever experienced: he asked everyone present to form a large circle around the sanctuary and pray the Lord's Prayer together as a show of unity in Christ.

The weeks and first few months after the vote were difficult. Tensions ran high. Some people stopped attending worship. Others made it known that they were leaving GA for good because of the action we had taken. The biggest "hit" we took was in the Sunday School. Several families in our modest-sized Sunday School left the church because of the rumored "rainbow curriculum" that was going to be forced on the children now that we were becoming a "gay church." I never understood that way of thinking, and it still makes me sad. Fortunately, our Sunday School has rebounded and now has more children attending than any of us can remember in a very long time!

As spring turned into early summer, I had an idea for something I hoped would build some unity and some spirit. I called a meeting to see if there would be interest in staging a production of "Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor[®] Dreamcoat." The response was huge, and rehearsals were held all summer long and into the fall. We did three shows of "Joseph…" on a weekend in November in the sanctuary of GA. Cast members included people on both sides of the RIC issue. We filled the sanctuary for all three shows, and our mood began to pick up.

As the years have progressed, we saw something interesting happen: we began to have young couples and young families join our congregation who said that they were attracted to GA because they saw the RIC logo and the rainbow logo on our website. As one of those people said: *We would never have even visited GA if it weren't for the RIC status. It's a matter of social justice.* We have had some GLBT members join over the years. Some have come and gone; some have stayed. But the pattern of young people coming here because of our RIC designation has been consistent. As a member of the Reconciling Works Twin Cities Board, I can attest that this is a pattern that is consistent with other RIC congregations as well. When congregations take this step, it attracts people who want to find a progressive church home that believes in social justice issues.

What about me? I'm still serving at GA all these years later. I'm 100% "out" to the congregation and feel 100% accepted as a gay man by the congregation. I love this congregation as I have since I started serving here. I respect so many people here for the faith and courage they show.

I look forward to our RIC Anniversary Celebration worship and education event on May 5. See you there!

Special Offering for ReconcilingWorks – Sunday, May 5

This year, GA is celebrating two milestone anniversaries. In addition to the 110th anniversary of our congregation being founded, we are also recognizing 15 years of being a Reconciling in Christ (RIC)

congregation. The purpose of the RIC program is to ensure the welcome, inclusion, celebration, and advocacy for people of all sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions; work for racial equity and commit to anti-racist work and support the national program. During worship on May 5th, we will be celebrating that milestone



and reaffirming the partner commitments of being an RIC congregation.

One partner commitment that I want to share about is supporting the national RIC Program. While it might feel "normal" for churches to be affirming of LGBTQIA+ folks, the truth is that only about 12% of ELCA congregations have done the work to be open and affirming. While support for the national program has not been present from GA in recent years, during worship on the 5th we will be taking a special offering that I hope will be the beginning of future support for this vital ministry.

Speaking as a new member to this community, I can share that one of the first things I do when I visit an ELCA congregation is see if they are RIC. And when learning about GA, I was thrilled to learn of the RIC status. I hope that as we gather for the RIC celebration worship, you would join my family in generously giving to support the work of the National RIC program with a special gift.

Land Acknowledgment

In May, Gustavus Adolphus will share a Land Acknowledgement at the beginning of worship, honoring our



Indigenous neighbors who have called Minnesota home from time immemorial. Land Acknowledgements are one small part of the restorative healing work that all Christians are called to, and to which Christians in the United States have a particular responsibility to embody. May is also the Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women's awareness month, a time for us to call attention to the crisis facing Native women across our state and the country. A study by the National Institute of Justice found that 1.5 million American Indian and Alaska Native women have experienced violence in their lifetime, and women on some reservations have been killed at a rate 10 times that of the national average. Throughout May, we will call attention to the sovereignty of our Indigenous
